General Comments/Feedback:

Speakers need to give consideration to reducing use of hydro-related acronyms where possible to make their presentations easier to comprehend for all concerned. I served on the Board of Directors of a local hydro utility 20 years ago and I know the Ontario system has its own language, at times. But, when speaking to a general audience like municipal officials, it’s probably a good idea to speak in general terms and avoid industry acronyms.
