Roberta Jamieson is Mohawk who has achieved many firsts. They include being the first First Nation woman in Canada to earn a law degree; the first woman Ombudsman of Ontario; and the first woman elected Chief of the Six Nations of the Grand River Territory.

Roberta has long been recognized as an accomplished expert in alternative dispute resolution and is an effective and visionary member of corporate boards, with an acknowledged expertise in Environmental, Social and Governance matters. She is currently on the board of directors of the Royal Bank of Canada, where she sits on the Risk and Governance committees, and Deloitte Canada and Chile, where she sits on the Governance and Quality committees. She is also a member of the Independent Directors Advisory Committee to the Chair of Deloitte's Global Board (DTTL).

Roberta is a former member of the Board of Directors of Ontario Power Generation and Hydro One. At the request of Prime Minister Trudeau, Roberta served on the inaugural Gender Equality Advisory Council during Canada's G7 Presidency.

As President of Indspire, Canada's largest Indigenous charity, Roberta oversaw an eightfold increase in bursaries and scholarships. Charity Intelligence Canada named Indspire one of the 10 Canadian Charities with the most impact and Macleans and the Financial Post chose it as one of Canada's Top Charities. Roberta has continued her involvement in philanthropy, most recently as a Founding Visionary of the Prosperity Project and as a member of the board of directors of the Rideau Hall Foundation where she Co-Chairs a national initiative to increase to more than 10,000 the number of Indigenous teachers.

	<p>Roberta has received 32 honorary degrees, earned numerous awards including the IPC designation from the Indigenous Bar Association, appointment to the WXM hall of Fame, the Indigenous Women's Leadership Award from the Canadian Council of Aboriginal Business, and has been recognized by the Public Policy Forum for outstanding contributions to the quality of public policy and governance in Canada. She is an Officer of the Order of Canada.</p>
 <p>Perry Bellegarde Former National Chief Assembly of First Nations</p>	<p>Chief Perry Bellegarde has dedicated his life to championing the rights and well-being of First Nations. For 35 years, he has held various First Nations leadership roles, including two terms served as the National Chief of the Assembly of First Nations (AFN). Chief Bellegarde believes passionately that at the heart of the original Treaty relationship sits a vision of peace and friendship that is the key to building a better and brighter future for Canada.</p> <p>A member of Little Black Bear First Nation, Chief Bellegarde credits the wisdom shared by the First Nations Elders of Saskatchewan for instilling in him a deep sense of pride in his culture, as well as a lasting conviction that Indigenous knowledge and values are crucial to building a more just and inclusive society. He describes himself as an oskâpêwîs, a Cree word meaning "helper", and he believes this understanding of the role and responsibilities of a leader applies to many walks of life.</p> <p>Chief Bellegarde has championed that vision through all his leadership roles. First, as the Tribal Council Representative for the Touchwood-File Hills-Qu'Appelle Tribal Council, and then as the Chief of the Federation of Saskatchewan Indian Nations, Councillor and Chief of Little Black Bear First Nation, and National Chief of AFN, a position he held from 2014-2021.</p> <p>As National Chief, Chief Bellegarde campaigned tirelessly to close the gap in the quality of life between First Nations and other families in Canada. He led the AFN through a period of profound transformation in public awareness of First Nations concerns and priorities. Critical accomplishments include the passage of Canada's first national legislation recognizing and protecting Indigenous languages, much needed changes in how government services in First Nations communities are funded and securing a legal commitment to a national implementation of the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples.</p>

	<p>Chief Bellegarde also influenced the acknowledgement of Indigenous Rights in the final Canada-United States-Mexico Agreement (CUSMA) as a member of the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA) Advisory Council. He has also raised the international profile of First Nations expertise on sustainable development, promoting rights-based solutions to climate change. Today, Chief Bellegarde is a special advisor to Fasken, an international law firm. He also serves as the chair of the First Nations Bank of Canada Board of Directors and as a special advisor to His Majesty King Charles III's Sustainable Markets Initiative.</p> <p>In recognition of his work, Chief Bellegarde has been awarded the Confederation Medal; the Saskatchewan Centennial Medal; and the Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medal, Golden Jubilee Medal, and Platinum Jubilee Medal. He is also the recipient of the Saskatchewan Order of Merit and an Honorary Doctorate of Laws from both Queen's University and Lakehead University. In 2021, Chief Bellegarde was named "Nation Builder of the Year" by the Empire Club of Canada and the Honorary President of the Royal Canadian Geographic Society. Chief Bellegarde is also the host of Ahkameyimok Podcast, which consistently rates highly in Apple's Canada-Government category.</p>
 <p>The Honourable Stephen Lecce Minister of Energy and Mines Province of Ontario</p>	<p>Stephen Lecce is Ontario's current Minister of Energy and Mines and the Member of Provincial Parliament (MPP) for King-Vaughan.</p> <p>Stephen Lecce was recently appointed as Ontario's Minister of Energy and Mines, with an expanded mandate focused on accelerating resource development.</p> <p>In his mission to position Ontario as an energy superpower, Stephen is expanding electricity generation—anchored by nuclear power—along with transmission and storage. To deliver on this urgent imperative, he announced the largest competitive public energy procurement in Canadian history, along with the plan to build the largest nuclear generator on earth.</p> <p>With his expanded mandate, he will work to aggressively unlock one of the largest untapped deposits of critical minerals and rare earth metals on the planet—vital to Canada's future prosperity and security. This includes accelerating permitting to get shovels in the ground, while working to diversify export markets—from minerals to nuclear energy.</p>

	<p>Stephen's first experience in politics began in his hometown of Vaughan where he was involved in the 1999 election of the late MPP Al Palladini. Since then, he has served as Chief Spokesperson to Canada's 22nd Prime Minister, the Rt. Hon. Stephen Harper. Upon his election in 2018, he served as Deputy Government House Leader, the Parliamentary Assistant to the Minister of Infrastructure, Parliamentary Assistant to the Premier, and then served as Ontario's longest-serving Minister of Education in modern history.</p>
 <p>Stan Wesley Kahnekahnekahtahk</p>	<p>Stan Wesley is from Moose Factory and currently living in Six Nations Territory with his wife Mandy and two daughters Maya and Tenona.</p> <p>With his high-energy and sincere professional approach, he's considered by many to be one of the most high energy speakers around.</p>

He was acclaimed Grand Chief in 2023 and was re-elected at the NAN Keewaywin Chiefs Assembly in 2024.</p> <p>His leadership priorities focus on systems transformation including health and child welfare, and advocating for improvements in education, housing, infrastructure, and access to clean water. He is also committed to justice reform, and the assertion and recognition of First Nations' treaty rights in land and resource development with Ontario and Canada.</p>
 Brooke McLeod Community Energy Champion Moose Cree First Nation	<p>Brooke McLeod is the Community Energy Champion for Moose Cree First Nation, where she supports and leads clean energy initiatives that advance both sustainability and sovereignty. Her work includes leading the Nation's own biomass utility, JB Aski, which reduces reliance on fossil fuels while creating local capacity and economic opportunity, as well as setting new pathways for energy efficiency and conservation.</p> <p>Inspired by her community's vision to keep traditions and values alive, Brooke is committed to engaging community members in shaping the decisions that impact their clean energy future. She believes Moose Cree's homelands hold tremendous opportunity, and through her role she is helping build a strong foundation that will serve her Nation for generations to come.</p>
 Bruce Achneepineskum Chief	<p>I have been Councilor for 18 years and Chief for 11 years over a span of 32 years.</p> <p>I'm a father with 2 adult daughters and son Joseph 3 years with my partner Larissa!</p> <p>As Chief, I advocate for our membership on political, legal and socio-economic issues and initiatives in our territory including our ancestral territory at Ring of Fire or Wawang Wajing as we call it!</p>

 <p>Cadmus Delorme Founder and Partner OneHoop Advisory Services and Flowing River Capital Group</p>	<p>Cadmus Delorme, a Cree and Saulteaux (pronounced: sow-toe), is a citizen of the Cowessess (pronounced: Cow-is-ess) First Nation.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Mr. Delorme was an elected Chief from 2016 to 2023. • In 2025, Mr. Delorme received an honorary Doctorate Degree from the Athabasca University • In 2023, Mr. Delorme received an honorary degree from the Saskatchewan Polytechnic Institution. • In 2021, he achieved an Institute of Corporate Director designation. • In 2016, he achieved a Masters of Public Administration from the Johnson-Shoyama (pronounced: Shoi-ama) Graduate School of Public Policy. • And, in 2013, Mr. Delorme achieved a Bachelor of Business Administration along with a Certificate in Hospitality, Tourism and Gaming Entertainment Management from the First Nations University of Canada (FNUniv). <p>In addition to his educational achievements, he has also been the recipient of numerous awards and sat on various committees, such as:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • In 2025 Mr. Delorme was awarded the King Charles III Coronation Medal. • In 2022 Mr. Delorme was awarded the Queen Elizabeth Platinum Jubilee. • In 2012, Mr. Delorme was awarded the Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medal for his student leadership and the hospitality he showed to King Charles III and his Queen Consulate Camilla when they visited First Nation University of Canada in 2012. • In 2015 Mr. Delorme was named one of CBC Saskatchewan's Future 40, which celebrates the province's new generation of leaders, builders, and change-makers under the age of 40.

	<p>While Chief, Mr. Delorme's focus was on three pillars: cultural rejuvenation, political sovereignty, and economic self-sustainability. During the seven years in office, Cowessess First Nation advanced in governance stability, child welfare reform, renewable energy projects, agriculture, property management, and more.</p> <p>In April 2023, Mr. Delorme chose to not run for a third term and soon after became a founder and Partner to OneHoop Advisory Services and founder and Partner to Flowing River Capital Group, which focuses on enhancing the private equity market through Truth and Reconciliation Call to Action #92: Business and Reconciliation, and #57: Professional Development.</p> <p>Mr. Delorme and his wife Kimberly raise his brother-in-law, daughter and two sons in Regina and on the Cowessess First Nation</p>
 <p>Damien Côté Chief Commissioner Ontario Energy Board</p>	<p>Damien Côté was appointed as Chief Commissioner in April 2025. He brings a wealth of expertise and experience to this role, including three years as a Board Member of the (former) National Energy Board, followed by three years as the inaugural Lead Commissioner at the Canada Energy Regulator (CER). Prior to the CER, he was the Executive Director of the Nunavut Water Board in Gjoa Haven (Nunavut), and as Chief Operating Officer of the Inuvialuit Regional Corporation in Inuvik (Northwest Territories). He also served as a Member of the Immigration and Refugee Board of Canada.</p> <p>Mr. Côté holds a Juris Doctor and a Licentiate of Laws from the University of Ottawa, a Master of Arts (Economics) from the University of Toronto, as well as a Bachelor of Engineering (Environmental) and a Bachelor of Arts (Economics) from Carleton University.</p>

The NSMTC Energy Services Division also supports the seven Mi'kmaq Nations of the Tribal Council on their path to a net-zero future, with initiatives spanning community energy planning, building retrofits, distributed energy resources, and electrification of corporate assets.</p> <p>Kevin holds a Bachelor of Science in Fire Science from Lake Superior State University and a Bachelor of Science in Mechanical Engineering from the University of New Brunswick.  <p>Linda Debassige Grand Council Chief Anishinabek Nation</p>	<p>Born and raised in M'Chigeeng First Nation, Linda Debassige is a devoted mother to two children and grandmother to one. Linda graduated with honours from Civil Engineering Technology in at Confederation College in Thunder Bay , and holds a Certificate in Negotiations from Osgoode Hall Law School.</p> <p>First elected to M'Chigeeng First Nation Council in 2013, Debassige was Chief from 2015-2023. During her tenure within the governance of M'Chigeeng, she participated in numerous portfolios, committees, and boards locally, regionally, and nationally, across many sectors including but not limited to treaty, infrastructure, water, housing, environment, policing, mental health and addictions, community safety, economic development, education, health, emergency management, and community development. She is currently serving as the Grand Council Chief of the Anishinabek Nation following a Traditional Stand-Up Election in June 2024.</p> <p>Linda is known for her strong leadership style, knowledge, dedication, and passion for all First Nations people and is often called upon for advice and advocacy for Indigenous communities, organizations, and leadership.</p> <p>Notably, Linda was the first Indigenous Trustee to hold the position of Vice Chair of the largest school board in Northern Ontario, the Rainbow District School Board. She also serves as a co-lead for the Assembly of First Nations on the co-development of the First Nation Safe Drinking Water and Wastewater Legislation.</p>

 <p>Luana Shirt Culture Keeper Red Sky Performance</p>	<p>Luana Shirt is Plains Cree - Anishinaabe kwe. Born in Treaty 6 Territory in Alberta, Luana's family relocated east in her early years and she was raised in Toronto among her Great Lakes relatives, the Anishinaabe and Haudenosaunee Nations.</p> <p>In the 1980s, she graduated from Wandering Spirit Survival School, Canada's first urban Indigenous school, founded by her parents on the principle of 'Self-Determination through Native Way Education'. A visual artist, chartered herbalist, and Indigenous language curriculum developer, Luana is deeply committed to promoting Indigenous ways of knowing and being.</p> <p>Her work centers on Indigenous language advocacy, women's holistic health and wellness, the arts, and the revitalization of traditional medicines. A mother of two, she currently resides in the Simcoe County region.</p>
 <p>Margaret Kenequanash CEO Wataynikaneyap Power</p>	<p>Margaret Kenequanash has spent over 20 years leading initiatives to bring reliable power to First Nations in northern Ontario. She has been CEO of Wataynikaneyap Power since August 2017: an Indigenous-led, licensed transmission entity that brought grid connection to remote First Nations previously powered by diesel generators.</p> <p>Margaret has a vast wealth of knowledge gleaned from over 25 years in various high-level positions, including being on the Sioux Lookout Municipal Council from 1990-1994 and Executive Director of the Shibogama First Nations Council from 2005-2017.</p> <p>Margaret carries the distinction of being the first female Chief in her community at North Caribou Lake First Nation when she was elected in 1996. She is well known and respected throughout First Nation communities and government for her work in promoting opportunities and better quality of life for First Nation Peoples.</p>
 <p>Marsha Roote</p>	<p>Marsha was raised in Saugeen First Nation, where she currently resides with her 2 sons, ages 15 and 18. After high school, she went on to complete 2 college diplomas before graduating with a Sociology degree from Western University. She has worked with Indigenous people from several communities across Ontario, in various capacities and sectors including Corrections, Post-Secondary Education, and Child Welfare. While studying and working away from home, she visited home regularly, met elders and knowledge keepers that helped her stay connected to her</p>

<p>Indigenous Community Engagement Lead</p> <p>Bruce Power</p>	<p>identity, which all supported her along her journey before moving home to the Saugeen Ojibway Nation territory.</p> <p>During her 10 years with Bruce Power, she has been a main contributor to the Indigenous Employment & Training Program and held positions such as Chair of the Indigenous Relations Supplier Network as well as Co-Chair of the Training, Education, Employment, Business Opportunities (TEEBO) committee alongside the Saugeen Ojibway Nation. Currently, Marsha is the Indigenous Community Engagement Lead as part of the Indigenous Engagement and Partnership team at Bruce Power.</p>
